

The Clery Act

The Jeanne Clery Campus Safety Act, commonly known as the Clery Act, requires all colleges and universities receiving federal funding to collect, maintain, and disclose information on Clery-specific crimes, including hazing, that occur on KU's Clery geography.

According to the Clery Act, the goal is to provide the campus community with timely, accurate, and complete information about crimes and safety so that you can make informed decisions to keep yourself safer. In short, the Clery Act is a consumer safety law.

To meet these requirements, KU relies on Campus Security Authorities (CSAs) to report crimes. CSAs are individuals who:

- Are working in the campus police or security department,
- Are responsible for aspects of on-campus security, and/or
- Have significant responsibility for student and campus activities.

Hate Crimes include:

Larceny-Theft
Simple Assault
Intimidation
Destruction/Damage/Vandalism
And all primary crimes, except Manslaughter by Negligence
